Introduction

As part of their annual renewal, we asked dentists and DCPs to answer a short survey on how they work, where they work and how long they work for each week.

This insight and information can help improve the sector's understanding of dental professionals' working patterns and inform discussions about future workforce resource planning.

24,152 dentists (55% of the dentist register) and 43,692 DCPs (58% of the DCP register) answered the working patterns questions. For DCPs this represented 54,600 (64%) of the total number of registered DCP titles.

This data will be published on the <u>reports section of the GDC website</u> and can be viewed on a national and individual country level. This can be viewed at dentist and total DCP level, as well as by individual DCP title.

The DCP data can be viewed as a total or by professional title, and at a national or country level.

Where the numbers are less than five, they have been removed to avoid identification of any individuals. These are identified by '...' in the excel tables.

The key highlights summarised in the following pages are based on an initial review by the GDC. They should not be considered as a comprehensive review of the findings from the data, rather they are a summary of some of the key highlights based on a UK wide analysis.

We would encourage stakeholder and professional bodies to review the data as there may be other highlights or information that would support workforce discussions that have not been highlighted in the tables that follow.

3	Which of the following best describes your current employment situation in the dental sector?	More than half (57%) were self- employed/agency or working as a locum. Only around a fifth (20%) were employees.

7	How many places of work do you commonly work in?	Almost four in ten (37%) regularly worked in more than one location, with 62% commonly working in one location.	
8	Considering all dental sector work you do, which of the following best describes the type of dental care you most commonly provide?	Nearly a fifth (19%) provided only private care, with no NHS and a further 14% said they worked predominantly (over 75% of their time) in private care.	
9	As a dental professional, where do you work?	Four out of five (80%) worked in England, 11% in Scotland, 5% in Wales and 4% in Northern Ireland.

Q#	Question	High level insight	
1	Are you currently working in the dental sector?	Nearly 99% of responding DCPs are currently working in the dental sector.	
2	What is your current primary field of practice?	Over three quarters (76%) of all respondents are working as dental nurses in the UK. The next largest cohort is dental hygienists, at nearly 10%. Less than 1% of respondents are working as clinical dental technicians.	
3	Which of the following best describes your current employment situation in the dental sector?	Nearly 80% of responding DCPs are employed. Only around 15% of all DCPs are self-employed/locum agency workers. This however varies significantly by professional title. Around 6% of those working in 'NHS only' clinical roles were self-employed /locum/agency. This is compared to 30% of those working in 'Private only' clinical roles, and 18% of dentists who worked in a 'Mix of NHS and Private' clinical roles.	
4	Considering all dental sector work you do, on average how is your time spent between clinical and non-clinical work?	Just under half of all responding DCPs (46.6%) are working fully in clinical roles. A further 18% are spending at least three quarters of their time in clinical roles. Nearly 6% of respondents are fully non-clinical.	

5	How many hours do you normally work a week as a dental professional?	Just under half (48.3%) of all DCP respondents told us they work between 30 and 40 hours a week. Slightly less than that (45.5%) said they work 30 hours or less.
6	Which dental setting/s do you work in?	Nearly two-thirds (64%) of respondents work in general dental practice, just under 6% work in a community setting, while 5% work in a dental hospital setting. Nearly 12% work in a specialist dental practice.
7	How many places of work do you commonly work in?	Over three quarters (77%) of all responding DCPs commonly work in one location. Over 20% regularly work in more than one location, with at least 1% even working in seven or more locations.
8	Considering all dental sector work you do, which of the following best describes the type of dental care you most commonly provide?	A quarter of responding DCPs said they provided only private care, with no NHS, and a further 11% said they worked predominantly (over 75% of their time) in private care. Only 15% of responding DCPs are fully NHS, with no private care, and a further 12% said they worked predominantly (over 75% of their time) in NHS care. More than a third (35%) of DCPs said they provided a mix of NHS and Private care.
9	As a dental professional, where do you work?	More than four out of five (81%) responding DCPs work in England, 10.5% in Scotland, 5% in Wales and 3% in Northern Ireland.

2	What is your current primary field of practice?	The vast majority (91%) of CDT respondents told us their primary field of practice was as a clinical dental technician. The rest practise as dental technicians.
3	Which of the following best describes your current employment situation in the dental sector?	More than two-fifths (43%) of CDT respondents are owners or part-own a business. Over a third (34%) are self-employed/locum/agency workers, while nearly 22% are employed.
4	Considering all dental sector work you do, on average how is your time spent between clinical and non-clinical work?	Over two-thirds (67%) of responding CDTs spend their time on a mix of clinical and non-clinical work. Only around 4% are fully clinical.
5	How many hours do you normally work a week as a dental professional?	Just under half (49%) of CDT respondents told us they work between 30 and 40 hours a week. Just over one in ten (11%) said they work between 50 and 60 hours.
6	Which dental setting/s do you work in?	Just under half (46%) of respondents work in a lab setting, nearly 9% work in a specialist dental practice and nearly 32% work in general dental practice.

3	Which of the following best describes your current employment situation in the dental sector?	Nearly nine-tenths (88%) of respondents are employed, while 7% of DN respondents are self-employed/locum/agency workers. Nearly 3% are on parental leave.
4	Considering all dental sector work you do, on average how is your time spent between clinical and non-clinical work?	More than two-fifths (44%) are fully clinical. A quarter (25%) of responding DNs spend their time on a mix of clinical and non-clinical work.

3	Which of the following best describes your current employment situation in the dental sector?	More than three-fifths (63%) of DTh respondents are self-employed/locum/agency workers, while 31% are employed. Only 1.3% are owners or part-own a business.

More than four-fifths (83%) of responding OTs are fully clinical, with a further 13% spending at least 75% of their time on clinical work. Only 2.5% spend their time on a mix of clinical and non-clinical work.
